Summer in Waukegan is almost over and everyone is looking forward to two fall events that are always well attended; the Cemetery Walk on Saturday, September 10, from 12-5 pm and our popular "Show and Tell" event on Sunday, October 16 at 3 pm.

The Cemetery Walk theme this year is "The Voter's Choice: Waukegan Votes That Mattered". Go to our website at www.waukeganhistorical.org to see the details of buying tickets and when and where to meet the shuttle buses. The Show and Tell event is so popular that we have decided to schedule it for every fall. Held at the Jane Addams Center in Bowen Park at 3:00 pm; just bring along something interesting from your personal collections and share the stories with everyone or just attend and enjoy objects brought by

someone else. We get very positive feedback on this event and it always surprises me what people bring in to share.

Fundraising for the Museum addition has been very successful so far this year. The matching fund offer that ended in June actually raised far more than the projected \$20,000 and the Board has authorized another matching offer which will begin this fall to double all donations by the end of the year up to \$25,000. Give \$1,000 and the Building Fund will actually receive \$2,000. Remember that donations are totally tax deductible.

The Tour of Homes this year lucked out again with good weather so that about 300 guests could enjoy three beautiful homes and gardens as well as St. Anastasia School and Church and, as always, the Museum and Library. We would like to sincerely thank all the volunteer room watchers, cashiers, and even the traffic wardens that helped with crossing Sheridan Road. We would especially like to thank the homeowners who graciously opened their homes to throngs of interested guests. It is always a very positive event for the Society and the City of Waukegan.

I would also like to thank all of the committee members of the Historical Society for all their hard work through the year: The Tour Committee that works to organize that annual event, the Library, Museum, Program, Finance, Museum Addition, Education, Publication, Historic Sites,

Tour of Homes Recap

The 48th Annual Tour of Homes was presented by the Historical Society on June 26, 2016 with over 300 guests attending the event. This is our largest fund raising event every year and has allowed the Society to accomplish so much over the years.

This year we were lucky to have convinced homeowners of three beautiful homes to open their doors to our visitors. The comments were especially positive this year perhaps because all three of the homes were in the same neighborhood and could be visited on foot. Two beautiful homes at 936 and 945 N. Sheridan Road were directly across from each other and 924 North County was only a block away. At 945 N. Sheridan visitors could see a home that was once a farmhouse with a barn and is situated at the top of the bluff overlooking the Lake. At 936 N. Sheridan the grand brick home has recently added a huge garden, water garden, and coach house that was once part of the property and had been sold off many years ago. Guests were amazed to "discover" the amazing additions hidden behind the home. At 924 N. County guests were treated to a beautiful four square Craftsman style home filled with Mission or Craftsman styled furniture that perfectly complimented the period of the house. The homeowners have worked for many years to restore this very comfortable home.

In addition to the homes open for the Tour; we were also lucky enough to have St. Anastasia Church and School open for the afternoon. This year the School and Church are celebrating their 100th anniversary and our attendees were able to walk the halls of the School and tour the magnificent Church.

The History Museum and the Raymond Library were also open to our guests and many people took advantage of this to talk to our volunteers and begin researching their own homes.

The success or failure of this event depends greatly on the weather and this year it looked as if

we were going to get rain all afternoon. However, someone was looking out for us and it remained clear and warm all afternoon. We look forward to 2017 and another great turnout for the Annual Tour of Homes.

22nd Annual Oakwood Cemetery Walk

Saturday, September 10 12:00-5:00 pm

The theme of this year's Oakwood Cemetery Walk is "The Voters Choice." Unique stories have been chosen for this year and they include: the vote that moved the County Seat from Burlington to Little Fort, Henry Hutchinson elected mayor while not even in town, the nasty mayoral battle of 1909, women voting for the first time in 1913, vote for prohibition, vote to change the name from Little Fort to Waukegan, Treaty of Chicago, vote to get "Waukegan out of the Mud," and the "Brothers of the Brush" vote in the 1959 Waukegan Centennial Celebration. Participants will also hear other unique Waukegan stories as well as the history of the City of Waukegan's Oakwood Cemetery.

The Cemetery Walk is sponsored by the Waukegan Park District, Waukegan Historical Society and the City of Waukegan. The Oakwood Cemetery Walk is an annual "living history" event that showcases the rich history of Waukegan through costumed actors portraying local historical figures with connections to the cemetery and Waukegan, Illinois.

Tickets: \$3 in advance, \$5 on the day of the Walk. Limited tickets available.

Start at Lilac Cottage in Bowen Park (1911 N. Sheridan Road) with buses taking participants to and from Oakwood Cemetery.

Historical Happenings

Waukegan's Firsts

Two of Waukegan's early citizens were men of great achievement.


Daniel O. Dickinson (1816 – 1869) was born in New York and came to Illinois in 1837. Initially he was a businessman with many endeavors. He built a store at State (Sheridan) and Washington. The upper level was known as Dickinson Hall, where Abraham Lincoln attempted to speak during his visit to Waukegan. The building was destroyed by fire December 13, 1866.

Daniel was in the storage, forwarding and commission business along the lakefront. He constructed a pier for lake shipping and later built a warehouse


there. The latter created a public spectacle when a wall gave way and tons of grain spilled out. He later had Dickinson Mills and Flour Shop below the bluff on Washington Street. He was involved with the development of the Michigan and Mississippi and Waukegan and Antioch Railroads, though neither operation was ever built.

After amassing great wealth, Daniel lost everything while involved in grain speculation.

On August 3, 1843 ten



Daniel also was involved in politics. He served as County Treasurer 1843-45 and Lake County

Commissioner 1845-46. He was Little Fort postmaster 1842-45 and again 1849-53. In 1849 Daniel was elected the first Village President and served a term of one year.

Elisha P. Ferry (1825 – 1895) was also successful although he spent most of his career in politics. Born in Michigan he became a lawyer and moved to Little Fort in 1846. Like Daniel Dickinson he served

as Village President 1856 – 59. When Waukegan was incorporated Elisha was elected its first mayor and served the then normal term of one year. He was involved in several public positions. Waukegan postmaster, Illinois state bank commissioner, presidential elector (twice), and member of the Illinois constitutional convention are just some of them. During the Civil War he was the assistant adjutant general on Gov. Yates' staff.

For the Abraham Lincoln visit cited above, Elisha served as host and provided his home for the night.

In 1869 he was appointed surveyor general of Washington Territory and re-located there. Three years later he was appointed the first governor of Washington Territory. When the territory gained statehood Elisha Ferry was elected its first governor.

Even with all this, he worked as a banker for a time.

Education Outreach Goes Back to School

In the coming days, the sound of school buses, as well as the sight of schoolchildren, will become part of our regular morning and afternoon routines again. Teachers and students alike share both an excitement and angst as the fall approaches. For nearly a decade, Museum Supervisor Ty Rohrer has been finding ways to make the phrase "back to school" one of enthusiasm for students, instead of words of dread. I wanted to take an opportunity to share with the membership how Ty has improved the quality of local-history instruction in our schools.

Several times a week, Ty can be spotted in one of our schools working with students on a number of different programs. He offers over twenty programs about Waukegan history, and has worked with schools to put together a year-long curriculum on local history as well. Third grade teacher, Rachelle Mendez of Glen Flora Elementary School, says that Ty's programs "bring history to life... help[ing] students to connect their city with other topics throughout the year."

In addition to his 118 school programs last year, Ty and the exceptional library staff spend hundreds of weekend and evening hours helping Waukegan High School students research their Chicago Metro History Fair topics. This has been an immeasurable help to my own students and me.

We all know just how much Ty does for the Historical Society in general, but as students prepare for a new school year, I felt the time was right to thank Ty and the society for informing the next generation about our city's history.

On display through the rest of the year is the exhibit "Wet V. Dry: Prohibition in Waukegan." This exhibit looks at the years leading up to local prohibition which was passed in Waukegan 4 years before the national act. Of special interest in the exhibit is the connection to the Temperance movement which had its first organized efforts in Little Fort (Waukegan) in 1845 as well as the impact of Women's Suffrage on prohibition. A unique artifact on display for the exhibit is a bottle of the last beer brewed locally at the Waukegan Brewing Company (formerly the Besley Brewery) in 1916.

As we remember our veterans in November, please keep the Waukegan Historical Society in mind



Building Addition Update— We Met Our Match!

In our last newsletter we reported the very encouraging preliminary results from our challenge grant where two long-time supporters of the Society had pledged \$10,000.00 to match dollar for dollar all donations received between April 1st and June 30th.
