It is truly an honor to serve as President of the Waukegan Historical Society for the next two years. This is such an exciting time in our organization's history. I hope you will join me in the work ahead to advance the Society's mission and grow to make an even bigger impact for everyone in our community. Your involvement and ideas are welcome!

As we began the new fiscal year, our dedicated Board of Directors has been hard at work to lead the Waukegan Historical Society forward by creating a detailed action plan to achieve our overall goals. I am pleased to highlight some of our recent accomplishments and share an update.

On October 18, we celebrated the groundbreaking for the future Waukegan History Museum at the Carnegie. We were thrilled to achieve this significant project milestone together with our longtime partner, the Waukegan Park District. This day was the result of many years of thoughtful planning, collaboration, partnership and community support. We have been especially fortunate to work with one of the top preservation architectural firms in the country, Harboe Architects, and a team of expert consultants who have been advising us throughout this entire process. Now, the construction phase of the project has officially begun!

At the same time, our exhibits team has been designing the visitor experience and creating exhibit concepts for the new museum. Working with the award-winning exhibit design firm, Luci Creative, we have developed an exhibit framework for new Waukegan history and natural resources exhibits which will guide the next steps in the design process. Last month, we presented these design concepts to the Waukegan Parks Board, and they shared our excitement about the vision for future exhibits. We look forward to telling more of the dynamic and diverse history of Waukegan and creating a welcom-

ing space where all visitors feel comfortable learning, exploring, asking questions and exchanging ideas. You'll see a preview of the exhibit concepts in this issue.

Our research library volunteers have been busy cataloguing our collections and digitizing thousands of historic images as we are converting to new collections and archives management software to enhance curation, expand outreach and improve access.

We will be renaming our current museum space to better reflect the stories we wish to tell there. The name of that museum will be "The Haines House Museum at Bowen Park." The museum is open Tuesdays, Thursdays and Saturdays from noon until 3:00 p.m. We look forward to welcoming you!

I am profoundly grateful to all those who support the museum, research library and our Waukegan Historical Society community, and hope you take pride in the collective progress we have made. This would not have been possible without your involvement and generous support. We will continue to need your help as we are raising funds for the exhibit schematic design and exhibit construction phases which are getting underway and will continue throughout the rest of 2022 and 2023.

Thank you for helping to move the Waukegan Historical Society forward through your support now and over the past 54 years. Together, we have an opportunity of becoming a model for historical societies and museums through the use of leading technology to tell expansive stories and attract audiences beyond our current reach.

On a chilly and windy day, the Waukegan Historical Society and the Waukegan Park District broke ground on their joint endeavor to bring a state-of-the-art historical museum to downtown Waukegan. The temperature outside the Carnegie Building might have been cold, but the sunshine and happy spirits at the ceremony won the day. As the custodians of Waukegan's history, we will surely look back on October 18, 2022 as one of the greatest days in the history of the Waukegan Historical Society.

Donors to the Waukegan History Museum at the Carnegie were treated to a VIP tour of the top floor of the building. President Lori Nerheim delivered remarks of gratitude and optimism for the future to our donors and members of the historical society who have helped to make the restoration and adaptive reuse of the cherished Carnegie building possible. We are certain that Ray Bradbury was looking down on the day with admiration as his old library is about to be brought back to life.

As members, donors, and our board of directors made their way outside, city officials, the Park District Board of Commissioners and Executive Director, historic preservation architect Gunny Harboe, United States Representative Brad Schneider, State Senator Adriane Johnson, and community members excited about the project met to see the groundbreaking and listen to impassioned speeches by all those who share the vision of a restored Carnegie.

Vision of the Carnegie Exhibits





Below: Rendering by Luci Creative of the proposed Bradbury Room in the Waukegan History Museum at the Carnegie.



The day called for poor weather (turned out to be beautiful all day) so all sites as part of the Literary Walk was moved in-doors to the Carnegie. This turned out though to be a wonderful evening where more than 450 attendees came to experience the building one last time, or for many, the first time, before it is transformed into the new museum.

Attendees were able to experience iconic scenes, acted out by local and regional actors, from some of Bradbury's most notable works. Folks were even treated to a puppet show that featured a narrator and music from a string quartet. We hope to be able to share parts of the performances from the Literary Walk later on our website and social media. The Literary Walk was funded through a grant from Illinois Humanities.
